Complicating matters was the evolving landscape of player empowerment. The rise of super-agents, social media influence, and guaranteed contracts shifted power dynamics. Ownership, confident in analytics, underestimated the emotional and psychological toll of high-stakes contracts on player performance and team chemistry. Social media sentiment, tracked via platforms like X (formerly Twitter) and Reddit, showed a 58% increase in negative discourse compared to 2020—driven by criticism of ownership’s handling of player injuries, perceived favoritism, and a lack of progress on accountability. The fallout extended to player development and scouting. Injuries to key young talent—such as Francisco Lindor’s strained shoulder in 2022—sparked debates over workload management and medical oversight. The front office’s reactive approach to roster construction, favoring star signings over systemic depth, left the team vulnerable to collapse. This pattern mirrored broader league trends: overreliance on aging stars, underinvestment in analytics infrastructure, and a cultural resistance to long-term planning.
