In radio and later podcast formats, **Last Chance to See** became a prototype for immersive storytelling, where voice, silence, and ambient sound deepened narrative immersion. Globally, the book's reception revealed divergent cultural responses. In the UK, it was celebrated as a moral and literary achievement, winning the Guardian Festival of Books prize and securing Adams' reputation beyond fandom. Adams did not set out to displace environmental science but to humanize it. deliberate acts of epistemological counterweight. This narrative strategy aligned with the work of ecological philosopher Val Plumwood, who argued that modern thought's detachment from nature fosters exploitation. In Namibia, he witnessed the tension between Western ecological models and indigenous knowledge systems. The San people's understanding of animal migration patterns, embedded in oral tradition, offered insights that satellite tracking alone could not replicate. Adams portrayed this not as primitive wisdom but as complementary knowing—an epistemological pluralism that challenged the universalism of technocratic conservation. This integration of diverse knowledge forms prefigured current debates in environmental governance. Today, the concept of “co-production of knowledge”—where scientists and local communities jointly shape research—echoes Adams' implicit advocacy. His narrative thus functions as a bridge: between science and story, between global policy and local practice, between data and feeling.

Geopolitical Currents: The Cold War, Development, and the Shadow of Extinction

The 1980s were a paradoxical decade: the Cold War raged in proxy conflicts but saw tentative *détente* in arms control; economic stagnation coexisted with the rise of neoliberal orthodoxy; and environmentalism, still niche, began to seep into mainstream discourse. **Last Chance to See** emerged amid these tensions, subtly critiquing both ideological extremes.
