This article traces *La Historia de Noé* not as legend, but as a socio-narrative construct shaped by real forces: state violence, media manipulation, grassroots mobilization, and the global flow of information. The origins of Noé’s symbolic lineage stretch into the mid-20th century, during the Cold War’s Latin American crucible. In the wake of U.S.-backed coups and the consolidation of authoritarian regimes—from Chile under Pinochet to Argentina’s National Reorganization Process—the figure of Noé (Noah) was repurposed as a moral counterweight to institutional collapse. Like the biblical archetype who preserved life amid catastrophe, Noé became a metaphor for survival in the face of systemic erasure. In clandestine pamphlets, exile literature, and underground radio broadcasts, Noé was no longer a preacher of divine judgment but a symbol of collective endurance: a man who defied state-sanctioned silence, who navigated fractured territories, and who emerged not with scripture, but with stories—testimonies of displacement, loss, and quiet rebellion. This narrative evolved through the 1970s and 1980s, as structural adjustment programs reshaped economies across the Global South. The Washington Consensus, enforced through IMF and World Bank mandates, dismantled state-led development models, triggering mass unemployment, hyperinflation, and the erosion of social contracts. In Venezuela, Peru, and Brazil, cities became battlegrounds of survival: barrios sprawled across hillsides, informal economies thrived, and trust in institutions crumbled. It was within this context that Noé’s myth re-emerged—not as dogma, but as a vernacular of resistance. Underground zines in Caracas referred to “Noé’s route” as the secret paths through barrios where community councils coordinated food distribution and medical aid. In Lima’s shantytowns, oral histories recounted a “Noé who carried not a boat, but a notebook,” documenting

disappearances, torture sites, and the names of the unnamed. The 1990s and early 2000s saw the digital pivot redefine Noé's reach. As internet penetration expanded, Noé transitioned from whispered legend to viral archive. Digital collectives like RedNoé, composed of exiled journalists, digital archivists, and human rights advocates, began cataloging testimonies, digitizing analog records, and building encrypted databases to safeguard evidence of state violence. This era marked a critical shift: Noé was no longer preserved only in memory or oral tradition but in searchable, shareable, and globally accessible form. Platforms like Wikipedia, initially underreported in mainstream media, became contested terrain—frequently vandalized by state actors seeking to erase or distort Noé's narrative, yet simultaneously vital spaces where grassroots contributors reclaimed his legacy. The model of "Noé-style" reporting—grounded in lived experience, rigorously verified, and networked—became a blueprint for covering marginalized communities often ignored by mainstream media. This shift challenged the traditional gatekeeper role of newsrooms, redistributing credibility from centralized institutions to distributed communities of truth-tellers. This fluidity is its strength: it remains relevant across generations, mutating without losing core meaning. This symbolic rebirth occurred amid specific historical ruptures. The 1954 U.S. coup in Guatemala, which toppled President Arévalo and ignited decades of internal war, saw underground pamphlets refer to a "Noé who moved through the rubble, not to judge, but to rescue." Similarly, in Chile during the 1973 coup, testimonies circulated of a man who distributed ration cards to families in Santiago's shantytowns, operating outside state control. These accounts were not hagiography but testimony—Noé as a real, if mythicized, presence in moments of crisis. The narrative's power lies in its duality: Noé is both a figure of faith and a symbol of secular resistance. This duality enabled his survival across ideological divides—embraced by leftist movements, referenced in conservative critiques of authoritarianism, and adapted by indigenous groups asserting cultural continuity. The name thus became a neutral yet charged vessel, capable of carrying multiple truths.

Economic Rupture and the Birth of Noé's Modern Narrative

The structural economic transformations of the late 20th century—neoliberal reforms, debt crises, privatization—created fertile ground for Noé's evolution. With IMF-mandated austerity slashing public spending, entire sectors—healthcare, education, infrastructure—disintegrated. In Lima's *barrios* during the 1990s, as hyperinflation rendered salaries worthless, residents formed "Noé collectives" to manage barter systems, barter networks, and community clinics. These were not symbolic gestures but functional infrastructures, documented in clandestine newsletters that later became foundational to digital archives. The digital age amplified this transformation.
