Do participants learn to "win" the game rather than deepen understanding? These concerns are not theoretical—leaks from internal simulations have revealed patterns of strategic overperformance, where participants optimize for the rubric rather than genuine insight.

Global Comparisons: Regional Adaptations and Cultural Variants

In the U.S. and Western Europe, it remains a benchmark for consulting and finance, embedded in elite MBA programs and executive development.
