In **Darwin's Dangerous Idea (1995), he extended evolutionary theory into the mind, arguing that cognitive faculties—including attention, memory, and self-monitoring—evolved not for truth per se, but for utility: for survival. The illusion of consciousness, Dennett contends, is a byproduct of this adaptive machinery. Our brains construct a coherent story of agency and awareness not because it reflects reality, but because such narratives increase fitness—enabling prediction, coordination, and social manipulation. This evolutionary lens reframes debates about machine consciousness. If consciousness is an adaptive solution, then creating artificial systems with similar functional architectures—capable of learning, self-modification, and narrative integration—may not require consciousness as we experience it, but could still produce behavioral and cognitive phenomena indistinguishable from sentience. Among cognitive scientists, Dennett is both revered and controversial. Within mainstream philosophy of mind, he is celebrated as a clarity-driven force who dismantled entrenched metaphysical assumptions. Philosopher Patricia Churchland calls him "the Darwinian of consciousness," praising his ability to unify empirical data with philosophical argument.
