These are not isolated incidents but systemic patterns, enabled by labor regimes that conflate migration with vulnerability. The geopolitical dimension deepens this crisis. Weak states with fragile institutions become conduits for exploitation, often pressured by international demand to remain open to foreign investment. Donor countries and multinational corporations, eager to secure supply chains or maintain regional stability, frequently prioritize economic partnerships over human rights. This complicity is subtle but pervasive—through trade agreements that ignore labor standards, or development aid conditioned on political cooperation rather than rights compliance. The result is a global economy built on invisible chains, where consumers in the Global North unwittingly sustain suffering through purchasing decisions. Expert voices diverge on solutions, but a consensus emerges on three fronts: legal harmonization, transparency, and worker empowerment. Dr. Kevin Bales, leading scholar on modern slavery, asserts: 'We need global legal standards that criminalize supply chain complicity, not just individual acts. Companies must be held legally accountable for forced labor in their networks, not just their direct employees.' This requires mandatory due diligence laws, like the EU's Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive and proposed U.S. Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act, though enforcement remains the challenge. Without independent verification, self-reporting remains unreliable.
