His framework provided a conceptual bridge between clinical psychology and broader philosophical inquiry, resonating with figures as diverse as existentialist philosophers, transpersonal psychologists, and even spiritual teachers. He drew heavily from the work of Evelyn Underhill, a pioneering mystic who mapped stages of spiritual development, and from the Zen teachings of D.T. Suzuki, whose writings on mindfulness and non-dual awareness paralleled Maslow's interest in altered states and self-transcendence. This synthesis marked a critical departure: psychology, from Maslow's view, could not ignore the dimensions of awe, reverence, and unity that had long been marginalized in Western science. He proposed a "topology of being" where consciousness expanded through stages—from animalistic survival, to social belonging, to esteem, to self-actualization, and finally to self-transcendence, where the self dissolves into a sense of interconnectedness with all existence.

This model was not static. Maslow's later work emphasized that self-transcendence was not a final destination, but a dynamic process—one requiring ongoing engagement with meaning, creativity, and

service. He identified five key “characteristics” of self-transcendent individuals: humility, authenticity, non-conformity, peak experiences, and a sense of service to others.
