Climate change demands ecological consciousness, yet the art market remains largely indifferent to its environmental footprint. The long-term survival of meaningful practice may depend on redefining value—not in dollars alone, but in cultural relevance, ethical responsibility, and resilience.

It is a space where genius is seen, but only through the lens of power.
