Traditional testing authorities, such as the Educational Testing Service (ETS) and Pearson, faced existential pressure. Their legacy models depended on human scoring and controlled environments—both incompatible with the distributed, automated nature of free fluency tools. In response, many pivoted: ETS launched a cloud-based oral proficiency platform in 2023, integrating AI scoring with human oversight, while Pearson acquired a startup specializing in phonetic analysis algorithms. Meanwhile, nimble startups like FluentAI and ReadWise emerged, offering open APIs and freemium models that bypassed institutional gatekeepers entirely. Their growth was exponential: by 2025, over 40% of primary schools in LMICs used at least one free reading fluency tool, according to UNESCO’s Global Education Monitoring Report.
