Political economist Susan Strange observed that Mandela’s rhetoric helped reposition South Africa as a stable, inclusive economy—critical in a world where post-conflict reconstruction depended as much on narrative as on policy. The Gulf War’s 1991 address by President George H.W. Bush, though brief, encapsulated the era’s economic geopolitics. Framing the coalition’s action as defense of international order and oil security, Bush fused national interest with global stability. The speech reflected the U.S. dominance in
