The doctrine of preventive war, articulated in the 2002 National Security Strategy, marked a departure from containment to proactive intervention—a shift that reshaped U.S. foreign policy for decades. Economic decision-making during Bush’s tenure was equally consequential, though often overshadowed by security imperatives. The early 2000s began with a recession, fueled by the bursting of the dot-com bubble and weak consumer confidence. His administration responded with a mix of tax cuts and stimulus measures, most notably the Economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001 and its 2003 extension. These policies, aligned with supply-side orthodoxy, aimed to stimulate growth through reduced burdens on individuals and corporations. However, they also contributed to long-term fiscal strain—reducing federal revenue at a time of rising military expenditures. The decision to fund two major wars without commensurate budget reallocations strained the federal budget, accelerated the national debt, and intensified debates over entitlement spending and deficit sustainability. The 2008 financial crisis marked a turning point, exposing structural weaknesses in the global financial system and forcing Bush’s administration into a role it was structurally unprepared for. The collapse of Lehman Brothers in September 2008 triggered a systemic meltdown, revealing the risks of deregulation, complex financial instruments, and excessive leverage. Bush, working with Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson and Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke, oversaw the passage of the Troubled Asset Relief Program (TARP) in October 2008—a \$700 billion bailout package that remains one of the most controversial interventions in modern history. The decision to use taxpayer funds to stabilize banks and automakers was driven by a stark calculus: collapse of the financial system would have cascading effects on employment, housing, and global trade. Yet critics argued it

rewarded recklessness, deepened inequality, and legitimized a culture of corporate impunity. Behind these macro-decisions lay a dense network of advisors, intelligence assessments, and institutional pressures. The role of figures like Vice President Dick Cheney, National Security Advisors Condoleezza Rice and Stephen Hadley, and Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld was pivotal. Cheney, in particular, embodied a strategic worldview rooted in centralized control and aggressive action, shaping key decisions around intelligence interpretation and military escalation. The reliance on flawed intelligence—especially the CIA’s estimates of Iraq’s WMD capabilities—revealed systemic failures in interagency coordination and critical thinking. The administration’s insistence on a “surgical” strike, based on contested evidence, underscored a cognitive bias toward decisive, military solutions over diplomatic or multilateral approaches. The war in Iraq, though launched with bipartisan support initially, unraveled into a protracted quagmire. The failure to find weapons of mass destruction, the rise of sectarian violence, and the emergence of ISIS transformed Iraq from a strategic victory into a quagmire that drained resources, eroded public trust, and destabilized the Middle East. The decision to invade without a clear post-war plan, and to disband the Iraqi army, created a power vacuum that empowered regional rivals like Iran and fueled Sunni resentment. The human cost—nearly 200,000 Iraqi civilian deaths, millions displaced—remains a grim testament to the limits of military power when divorced from political reconstruction. Domestically, Bush’s leadership during crisis also reshaped the relationship between government and citizenry. The creation of the Department of Homeland Security, the expansion of surveillance under the Patriot Act, and the use of executive authority in detentions at Guantanamo Bay signaled a permanent shift toward security absolutism. These measures, justified as necessary for national survival, raised enduring questions about civil liberties, due process, and the erosion of constitutional norms. The tension

between security and freedom, once framed as temporary, has persisted into the 2020s, influencing debates over immigration, counterterrorism, and digital privacy. Economically, the post-2001 era saw a reconfiguration of risk and responsibility. The Federal Reserve's unprecedented monetary interventions—near-zero interest rates and quantitative easing—prevented a depression but contributed to asset inflation and long-term debt dependency. The Bush tax cuts, extended under political pressure, became a structural feature of fiscal policy, limiting Congress's ability to respond to future crises with aggressive fiscal tools. The 2008 crisis exposed the fragility of a growth model reliant
