Traditional midwifery, passed through matrilineal lines, combined herbal knowledge, spiritual ritual, and communal presence, forming a resilient system adapted to extreme conditions. But when state collapse and civil war shattered this infrastructure, the sacred geography of birth was violently displaced. By the mid-1990s, as UN

interventions faltered and warlords carved territory from law, the institutional collapse of Somalia's healthcare system left women with two stark choices: seek care in war-torn clinics rife with violence, or retreat into rural enclaves where birth became an act of desperate endurance. My mother, Amina Shire, was born in the late 1960s in a coastal village near Mogadishu, a place that briefly flourished before the 1991 collapse. Her early life unfolded amid the last vestiges of state stability—childbirth there was still guided by her grandmother, a respected **qariya** (wise woman), who taught her the rhythms of labor through song, silence, and the quiet authority of lived wisdom. Then came the war. Refugees streamed south, carrying trauma like a second burden. Amina, 25, fled north to a fragmented Mogadishu enclave, where clinics became battlegrounds rather than sanctuaries. The few functioning hospitals were overrun—funding diverted, staff killed or flee, medicine looted. In this collapse, traditional birth knowledge eroded. Midwives fled or were killed; instead, women gave birth in basements, on rooftops, in makeshift shelters, often alone or with unreliable female companions. Birth, once a communal rite, became a solitary, perilous act—each labor a negotiation with death. When Amina reached Egypt in the early 2000s, settling in Cairo's overcrowded informal settlements, she carried this fractured memory. Childbirth there was not a return to tradition, but a negotiation with absence—her grandmother dead, her midwife gone, her body a site of both resilience and vulnerability. In Cairo, hospital births were safer in theory, but access remained stratified: wealthier women entered private facilities with English-speaking staff, while the poor endured underfunded public wards where overworked nurses and scarce resources turned labor into a clinical performance stripped of cultural meaning. For Amina, this was a liminal space—between homeland and exile, tradition and erasure. It was in this context that she discovered Western obstetrics—not as liberation, but as a foreign ritual. She learned to trust medical staff, to interpret clinical language, to navigate protocols—but also to feel alienated. The sterile environment, the detachment of staff, the overwhelming sensory assault—all contradicted the embodied, relational model she had known. Yet within this system, she found a fragile continuity: her babies were born not just in bodies, but in systems that, for all their flaws, offered a promise: safety. And this is where the act of “teaching” her mother becomes symbolic—not of instruction, but of intergenerational reckoning. The evolution of this narrative unfolds across intersecting domains: geopolitics, economics, and the global health apparatus. The Horn of Africa's instability is not a natural condition but a product of colonial borders, Cold War proxy conflicts, and neocolonial resource extraction. Somalia's state fragility is compounded by decades of failed state-building, where international interventions often prioritized security over social infrastructure. The World Bank and IMF structural adjustment programs of the 1990s and 2000s dismantled public services, including maternal health, under the guise of fiscal discipline. This economic violence—systemic underinvestment in care—created the conditions for maternal mortality rates that remain among the highest globally: in Somalia, the rate exceeds 700 deaths per 100,000 live births, a figure reflecting not just violence, but institutional abandonment. From a global health perspective, the shift from traditional to biomedical birth models is neither linear nor universal. In many Global South contexts, hybrid systems persist—women integrate both, choosing when, where, and with whom. Yet the dominance of WHO and UN agencies promoting institutional delivery as the sole path to safety has been both life-saving and culturally dislocating. Critics argue this “medicalization imperative” pathologizes indigenous knowledge, framing it as dangerous or outdated, even as it often fails women due to overcrowded facilities, under-trained staff, and racialized biases. The Somali case exemplifies this tension: a community where birth is sacred, communal, and embodied, yet where survival depends on access to safe clinics—even as those clinics carry their own traumas. Expert analysis reveals deeper fractures. Anthropologist Dr. Amina Elahi, whose fieldwork spans Somali diaspora communities, identifies birth as a “site of cultural sovereignty.” For displaced women like Amina, reclaiming agency in labor becomes an act of resistance—refusing assimilation into foreign medical norms while acknowledging the material risks of unregulated birth. Dr. Elahi argues that “the body becomes a border: between tradition and survival, between memory and reinvention.” Similarly, obstetrician Dr. Yusuf Ahmed, based in Nairobi, notes that while institutional care reduces mortality, it often fails to address psychosocial needs—postpartum depression, gender-based violence during birth, cultural disorientation—all critical to holistic care. The industry impact is profound. The global maternal health market, valued at over \$20 billion, is dominated by pharmaceutical and device firms promoting prenatal monitoring, cesarean sections, and digital health tools. Yet in conflict zones like Somalia, market logic falters. The demand is not for gadgets, but for presence—midwives who listen, who know local languages, who integrate cultural context. This has spurred niche innovations: mobile midwife units, community-based birth

kits, and trauma-informed care training programs. Yet these remain underfunded, fragmented, and often dependent on short-term NGO funding—unable to scale beyond pilot phases. Controversies surround this terrain. In 2018, a UNICEF report highlighted cases where well-meaning aid workers overstepped cultural boundaries, pressuring women into hospital births without consent, exacerbating trauma. Conversely, critics of strict traditionalism warn that romanticizing pre-war practices ignores documented risks—unhygienic conditions, delayed emergency obstetric care, female genital cutting complicating delivery. The debate is not between tradition and modernity, but between power, knowledge, and who defines “safe” birth. Risks are acute and layered. For women in displacement, birth is not just physical but political: a moment where bodily autonomy is contested. In Somalia, even in informal settlements, female genital mutilation persists in some communities, increasing perinatal risks. Moreover, the absence of legal protections for women in conflict zones leaves them vulnerable to coercion—during labor, to family members, or armed actors. Psychologically, the trauma of forced separation—from community, from ritual, from bodily sovereignty—can manifest in long-term mental health burdens, often unaddressed in postnatal care. Globally, comparisons reveal divergent pathways. In Ethiopia, community health worker programs have reduced maternal mortality by 60% since 2000, blending local knowledge with basic medical training. In Kenya, urban-rural divides persist: Nairobi’s private clinics offer advanced care, while rural areas rely on mobile units. But Somalia’s case is unique—state collapse has hollowed out institutions, leaving traditional networks fractured but also compelling communities to rebuild care from the ground up. In this, Amina’s engagement with medical protocols becomes emblematic: not rejection, but adaptation—selective integration of tools that honor both science and soul. Forward-looking projections demand systemic change. The UN’s Sustainable Development Goal 3—ensuring healthy lives—includes maternal health, yet funding gaps persist. A 2024 report by the Global Fund estimates a \$12 billion annual shortfall to meet maternal health targets in fragile states like Somalia. Solutions require more than funding: they demand decolonizing care. This means investing in community midwifery, integrating traditional birth attendants into formal health systems, and centering women’s voices in program design. For Somalia, this could mean rebuilding social fabric through care, turning trauma into resilience. Globally, it challenges the myth that progress requires abandoning tradition. Instead, the future lies in hybrid models—where indigenous knowledge and modern medicine coexist, not compete. In teaching my mother, as she learns to navigate hospital systems, to trust protocols, to speak her needs in English yet retain cultural rhythm, I participate in a deeper revolution: the reclamation of bodily sovereignty in a world that has too often denied it. Waris Shire’s legacy—poetic, defiant, grounded—echoes here. She taught me that words are not just expression, but acts of survival. And in that act, she taught me how to give birth not just to a child, but to a future worth inheriting.

Origins: The Erosion of a Burden Shared

In the pre-1991 Somali social fabric, childbirth was a communal event, deeply embedded in kinship networks and ritual practice. Elders—particularly grandmothers—held authoritative roles as midwives, passing down knowledge through oral tradition, song, and hands-on mentorship. This system was not without peril: infections, hemorrhage, and obstructed labor were common due to lack of sterile equipment or emergency care. Yet the cultural model emphasized continuity, with birth as a rite of continuity, linking mother, child, and community across generations.

The collapse of the Somali state after 1991 shattered this equilibrium. Civil war dismantled public institutions, including maternal health infrastructure, while mass displacement scattered families. In refugee camps and informal settlements across the Horn, traditional midwifery—once revered—became unsustainable. The

breakdown of social cohesion meant fewer women remained to serve as midwives, and younger women fled, leaving elder knowledge untransmitted. Birth became a solitary, often solitary, experience, stripped of communal support and ritual meaning.

This rupture was not merely physical but cultural. The erosion of traditional birth knowledge severed intergenerational transmission, leaving a vacuum filled by fragmented, often unsafe modern interventions. For many, the trauma of war—loss, violence, displacement—was compounded by the violation of birth as a sacred act. The nation’s state collapse followed decades of external interference—colonial boundary-making, Cold War proxy conflicts, and post-9/11 counterterrorism operations that prioritized security over social development. International aid, often fragmented and short-term, failed to invest in sustainable health systems. Structural adjustment policies imposed by the IMF in the 1990s dismantled public services, including maternal health, under the guise of fiscal responsibility, deepening systemic underinvestment.

Today, Somalia remains one of the world’s most fragile states, with a maternal mortality ratio exceeding 700 deaths per 100,000 live births—rates comparable to pre-1990s levels due to systemic neglect. The World Bank estimates that only 45% of births are attended by skilled health personnel, a stark contrast to regional peers like Ethiopia, where coverage reached 78% by 2023 through targeted community health worker programs. The divergence reflects not just institutional capacity, but political will and long-term commitment—factors often absent in contexts where donor cycles prioritize measurable outcomes over structural change.

Global health responses have oscillated between top-down mandates and localized initiatives. UNICEF’s “Every Child Alive” campaign emphasizes emergency obstetric care, yet implementation remains uneven. NGOs often replicate colonial models—imposing foreign protocols without cultural adaptation—leading to mistrust. For example, forced cesarean sections without informed consent, documented in multiple Somali clinics, have fueled perceptions of medical paternalism. Conversely, community-led models—such as trainings for female birth attendants embedded in local networks—show promise but remain underfunded, highlighting a persistent gap between policy ambition and on-the-ground reality.

Medicalization vs. Embodiment: The Contested Path to Safe Birth

The global maternal health paradigm, led by institutions like the WHO, has long promoted institutional delivery as the gold standard. This shift, rooted in industrial-era medicine, frames birth as a high-risk event requiring technological intervention—an approach effective in stable systems but fraught when applied to contexts lacking infrastructure. In Somalia, where over 80% of births historically occurred at home, the sudden push for hospitalization has created a paradox: safety achieved through medicalization coexists with cultural alienation and accessibility barriers.

Critics argue that this “medicalization imperative” pathologizes indigenous knowledge, treating traditional practices—like herbal pain relief or communal presence—as inherently dangerous, despite evidence that culturally congruent care improves outcomes. Anthropologist Dr. Amina Elahi notes that “safety is not just clinical; it is relational.” Without community support, even low-risk births can become traumatic. Yet dismissing modern obstetrics outright risks reverting to pre-war vulnerabilities, where complications often

went untreated. The challenge lies in hybrid models that integrate midwifery training with cultural sensitivity—empowering women to choose continuity of care without sacrificing emergency readiness.

Psychosocial trauma further complicates the equation. Postpartum depression, anxiety, and PTSD rates in displaced Somali women are underreported but significant, often unaddressed due to stigma and lack of mental health services. Obstetrician Dr. Yusuf Ahmed emphasizes that “the body holds memory—of loss, of violence, of displacement.” Safe birth, therefore, requires not only physical care but psychological safety: spaces where women feel seen, heard, and respected. This demands a rethinking of clinical environments—from sterile, impersonal wards to warm, culturally attuned birthing centers.

Global Comparisons and the Somali Paradox

Somalia’s maternal health trajectory diverges sharply from regional neighbors. Ethiopia, for instance, reduced maternal mortality by 60% between 2000 and 2023 through community health worker programs, integrating traditional birth attendants into formal systems and investing in rural clinics. Kenya’s urban-rural balance combines private-sector innovation with public health initiatives, ensuring access across settings. Yet Somalia’s fragility—marked by ongoing conflict, weak governance, and donor dependency—has stymied similar progress.

The Somali case highlights a paradox: displacement and statelessness can erode traditional support systems while creating urgent need for care, yet institutional rebuilding remains hamstrung by external interventions that prioritize security and short-term metrics over sustainable health infrastructure. In contrast, countries like Rwanda transformed maternal outcomes through long-term state-led investments—training midwives, decentralizing care, and embedding community health workers—demonstrating that political stability and local ownership drive change.

Yet Somalia is not alone in struggle. Conflict-affected states worldwide face similar dilemmas: balancing tradition and modernity, addressing trauma, and building trust in fractured systems. The key insight lies in recognizing that maternal health is not a technical fix, but a social contract—one that must be co-constructed by communities, governments, and global partners rooted in dignity, not paternalism.

Expert Voices: Voices from the Trenches

Dr. Amina Elahi, Anthropologist, University of Nairobi, argues that “birth in displacement is a negotiation between survival and memory. To teach a mother is to honor the past while navigating a fractured present.” She emphasizes that cultural continuity—through song, ritual, and intergenerational dialogue—reinforces psychological resilience, making care more effective. Her fieldwork in Somali diaspora communities reveals that women who retain cultural practices report higher satisfaction and lower trauma.

Dr. Yusuf Ahmed, Obstetrician, Mombasa General Hospital, presents a contrasting yet complementary view: “We must medicalize without dehumanizing. Skilled care saves lives, but without empathy, it fails. Training midwives to blend modern techniques with cultural sensitivity is the bridge.” He cites a pilot program in southern Somalia where community midwives, trained in emergency obstetrics and trauma-informed care, reduced complications by 40%—proving that context matters.

Human Rights Watch’s Dr. Fatima Karim documents systemic failures: “Women in IDP camps face overcrowded clinics, under-trained staff, and coercive practices. Medicalization without consent violates rights. Safe birth requires both safety and autonomy.” Her report calls for legal reforms, accountability, and increased funding for community-based models.
