In Nigeria, for example, local firms collaborate with Pearson to insert Yoruba proverbs and regional geographic references into fill-in-the-blank exercises, enhancing cultural resonance. Similarly, in Indonesia, publishers integrate Bahasa Indonesia idioms and Javanese social norms into grammar drills, fostering relatability. These adaptations are critical: without them, worksheets risk alienating learners through cultural dissonance. Distribution channels further shape accessibility. In high-income countries, digital platforms like Quizlet, LingQ, and Duolingo integrate fill-in-the-blank exercises into subscription-based apps, enabling adaptive learning. In contrast, low-resource regions often depend on printed materials distributed through government education programs or NGO partnerships. Here, affordability and durability remain key: paper-based worksheets must withstand humid climates and repeated use, while digital tools require minimal bandwidth. While this promises tailored instruction, it also centralizes control in tech-driven platforms, raising concerns about data privacy, algorithmic bias, and the erosion of teacher agency. Yet this alignment carries implicit cultural assumptions: that Western syntax and rhetorical styles represent universality, marginalizing indigenous communication practices. In Southeast Asia, ESL worksheets from Singaporean and Malaysian publishers often incorporate regional linguistic features—Malay honorifics, Thai tone markers—balancing global standards with local identity. This hybrid model reflects a broader strategy: using English not to erase diversity, but to position learners as bilingual agents within a global economy. However, such efforts remain exceptions. More often, standardized worksheets reinforce linguistic homogenization, privileging a monolithic “Global English” that risks diluting linguistic pluralism. China’s growing influence adds another layer. Through the Belt and Road Initiative, Chinese educational firms have expanded into Africa, Latin America, and Southeast Asia, offering localized ESL content that blends Mandarin-influenced grammar with English syntax. These materials often emphasize practical communication—business English, technical terminology—aligned with China’s economic corridors. While framed as equitable access, they also extend China’s linguistic footprint, raising questions about educational sovereignty and long-term

cultural alignment. The geopolitical dimension extends to data and control. Digital worksheets generate vast troves of learner data—response times, error patterns, engagement metrics—which are increasingly valuable for market intelligence and policy planning. When this data flows to foreign publishers or state actors, concerns about surveillance, manipulation, and dependency emerge.
