Artificial intelligence and machine learning are transforming how anatomy is taught and applied. AI-driven imaging systems now parse anatomical structures in real time, but their training data relies heavily on Western corpora, risking bias. To counter this, researchers are developing inclusive datasets incorporating diverse anatomies—such as variations in bone density, muscle distribution, and organ positioning across ethnic groups. Simultaneously, a growing movement advocates for “pluriversal anatomy”—a framework that integrates local terminologies and embodied knowledge into global standards. This approach does not reject Latin and Greek roots but expands the linguistic palette to include indigenous terms, defensive vocabulary (e.g., *herniated disc* vs. *alma rompida* in Spanish), and culturally grounded metaphors. Such pluralism could enhance clinical relevance and empower marginalized communities in health decision-making. Regulatory bodies face mounting pressure to modernize. The IFAA’s ongoing revision of the Terminologia Anatomica now includes guidelines for inclusive terminology, encouraging institutions to document and validate regional variants. Meanwhile, medical licensing boards in countries like Brazil and Nigeria are piloting curricula that assess not just memorization but contextual application—testing students on how they interpret anatomical descriptions across cultural settings. Economically, anatomical terminology will remain central to the expanding bioeconomy. Precision medicine, gene editing, and regenerative therapies depend on exact anatomical targeting—whether delivering

CRISPR vectors to a specific cell cluster or placing a neural implant in the central sulcus. As these technologies mature, terms evolve rapidly: “stromal vascular fraction” in stem cell therapy, “fibroblast activation protein” in fibrosis research, “meningeal lymphatic pathways” in immunotherapy—each reflecting a deepening, often fragmented, understanding of human structure. Yet this fragmentation poses a paradox: the more precise the language becomes, the more it risks alienating non-specialists and eroding public trust. The average patient encounters terms like “femoral artery” or “fornix” not through direct experience but via provider interpretation—often opaque. Bridging this gap demands new communication strategies: plain-language anatomical guides, interactive 3D models, and clinician training in narrative medicine. The goal is not to simplify, but to humanize—ensuring anatomical knowledge serves not only experts but patients, caregivers, and communities. In geopolitical terms, control over anatomical knowledge equates to influence over health futures. Nations investing in indigenous anatomical research—such as South Africa’s work on genetic variants in *HBB* and *HLA* genes—gain leverage in global health policy and pharmaceutical partnerships. Similarly, China’s Belt and Road Initiative includes investments in regional medical education hubs, promoting Mandarin anatomical curricula as part of soft power. This linguistic infrastructure is strategic, shaping not only clinical practice but also soft governance. Long-term, the trajectory points toward dynamic, adaptive anatomical lexicons—fluid, inclusive, and technologically integrated. The International Anatomical Terminology Network (IATN), proposed by the WHO, aims to create a living standard: one that evolves through consensus, incorporates real-world clinical variation, and respects cultural plurality. This network would serve as a digital, multilingual repository, accessible to clinicians, educators, and researchers worldwide, powered by open science principles. Yet fundamental challenges remain. How do we balance standardization with local

relevance? How do we prevent terminology from becoming a tool of exclusion in an already unequal global health landscape? And how do we preserve the body's intrinsic complexity beneath a grid of labels—without sacrificing the clarity that enables life-saving precision? The answer lies not in abandoning anatomical terms, but in reimagining their role. They are not mere codes, but cultural artifacts—woven with history, power, and aspiration. As medicine advances toward personalized, predictive, and participatory models, anatomical terminology must evolve from static labels into dynamic, inclusive frameworks. It must serve as a bridge between tradition and innovation, between global standards and local wisdom, and between scientific rigor and human dignity. In the end, to understand anatomical terminology is to understand how humanity has sought to map itself onto the body—with all its precision, ambiguity, and profound significance. It is a story written in bones, blood, and language—one that continues to shape how we heal, how we teach, and how we relate to our most intimate selves.

Anatomical terms are more than vocabulary—they are instruments of power, precision, and possibility.
