These hymns, composed in a dialect of early Iranian, reflect a worldview increasingly antagonistic to the capricious *daevas* venerated in earlier Indo-Iranian religion, favoring a single, uncreated creator god: Ahura Mazda. Scholars debate whether Zarathushtra was a reformer responding to socio-religious stagnation or a visionary emerging in a period of upheaval—possibly during the collapse of Elamite and early Median polities. The geopolitical context of the time was one of shifting power: the rise of urban centers in the Iranian Plateau, intensified trade along the Silk Road's western periphery, and increasing contact with Mesopotamian and Anatolian civilizations. Zarathushtra's critique of ritual excess and moral ambiguity likely resonated with emerging merchant elites seeking a faith that justified both spiritual discipline and economic ambition. His emphasis on individual ethical choice—where salvation is earned through good thoughts, words, and deeds—offered a radical alternative to fate-bound cosmologies, aligning with the rise of more self-determined social roles in early Iranian societies. Geographically, the highlands of Azerbaijan and northeastern Iran provided a liminal space for his message. These regions, crossroads of migration and cultural exchange, allowed Zarathushtra's teachings to diffuse through tribal networks before coalescing into institutional form under Achaemenid patronage. The Avesta's oral transmission, preserved by **magi** (priestly custodians), ensured doctrinal continuity even as political fortunes shifted. By the time of Darius I's reign (522–486 BCE), Zoroastrianism had become the empire's *de facto* ideological pillar—its dualistic cosmology mirroring the empire's own struggle to maintain order across vast, diverse territories.

The flight of Parsis to India in the 8th–10th centuries preserved a core tradition, but isolation limited doctrinal evolution. Economically, Zoroastrian communities in Persia became influential in trade and finance, particularly in port cities like Bandar Abbas, where they mediated commerce between East and West. This adaptability allowed survival, yet the faith’s global presence remained constrained until the modern era.
