In the dim glow of a church pew, where time bends and the air thickens with incense and prayer, a distinct musical grammar unfolds—one that transcends mere melody, becoming a language of collective memory, emotional endurance, and theological assertion. As the Black church expanded in the post-Emancipation era, so too did its musical language. Music became a form of resistance, a way to codify spiritual truths that secular discourse could not safely utter. Dr. Samuel Floyd Jr., a leading scholar of African American music, argues that these progressions function as “sonic liturgy,” where harmonic structure reinforces theological meaning. The flattened seventh, for instance, is not merely dissonant—it signifies the “in-Between,” the space between despair and salvation, a sonic representation of divine transcendence. Similarly, the use of the dominant seventh chord creates a sense of anticipation, a musical metaphor for prayerful expectation. In the words of gospel pianist and theorist Calvin Lowry, “Every chord is a word. We speak in sevenths because we believe every word must carry weight.” Controversies surround the appropriation and simplification of gospel harmonies.
