This vertical integration grants Beijing significant leverage: in 2023, China restricted rare earth exports amid trade tensions with the U.S., highlighting how green industrial policy can mirror fossil fuel weaponization. In response, the EU's Critical Raw Materials Act and the U.S. Inflation Reduction Act's domestic content rules aim to reduce dependency through subsidies, recycling investments, and partnerships with allied nations. These efforts, however, risk triggering a "green mercantilism" that fragments global supply chains and inflates costs. Meanwhile, fossil fuel exporters face existential uncertainty. Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 includes massive investments in green hydrogen and renewable energy, seeking to diversify beyond oil. Moscow's pivot toward Arctic LNG and digitalization of energy exports attempts to preserve relevance, but structural inertia and sanctions limit reinvention. Electricity's role as a strategic asset is further amplified by grid interconnectivity. Europe's synchronized grid, once a symbol of unity, now faces strain under variable renewable loads. The North Sea Wind Power Hub—an ambitious offshore grid linking ten nations—aims to balance supply across time zones and weather systems, but intergovernmental coordination remains delicate. In Asia, cross-border electricity trade is nascent: India's southern grid connects to Bangladesh and Nepal, but regional tensions and infrastructure gaps hinder broader integration. Without deeper cooperation, the full potential of renewable energy as a stabilizing force remains unrealized. The rise of national energy sovereignty complicates global coordination. While the U.S. and EU promote open markets, China and Russia emphasize self-sufficiency. This divergence risks creating blocs—"green" versus "state-led"—undermining collective climate action. The International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) advocates for global standards in certification, recycling, and technology transfer, but political will remains uneven. Geopolitical competition also extends to digital energy infrastructure. Smart grids, AI-driven demand forecasting, and blockchain-based peer-to-peer trading require secure, interoperable systems. Cybersecurity threats—ranging from ransomware to state-sponsored sabotage—pose acute risks. In 2022, a cyberattack disrupted power in Ukraine's capital, exposing vulnerabilities in digitized grids. As grids become more intelligent, the line between energy security and national security blurs, demanding new doctrines and international norms. Ultimately, the electric energy transition is not a neutral technological shift but a geopolitical reordering. It challenges the post-WWII consensus that energy abundance ensures peace and prosperity. Instead, it introduces new fault lines—over minerals, technology control, and grid sovereignty—requiring a recalibration of diplomacy, trade, and development policy. The nations that master this new order will not only lead in decarbonization but in shaping the future of global power.
