Each figure, in their discipline, becomes a prism refracting Pirandello’s legacy across cultural and temporal fractures. Expert analysis

But this technology risks reducing his ambiguity to pattern recognition. The true legacy lies not in extraction, but in continuation: in how each seeker, in their voice, becomes a conduit for Pirandello's enduring question: What is real? Who speaks? And what does it mean to be an author in a world where all identities are, in some sense, performance? The search for Pirandello is thus a mirror held to the present—revealing how the past, in its fragmented forms, continues to shape our struggle to define truth, memory, and self. It is a long-form reckoning not with a man, but with the enduring tension between certainty and becoming. In chasing the ghost of a 20th-century dramatist, these six figures are, in fact, confronting the soul of modernity itself.
