By the 2000s, childhood obesity rates in Illinois had surged past the national average, with nearly 30% of adolescents classified as overweight or obese—a trend mirrored across the United States but with regional severity intensified by socioeconomic polarization. Japan's "bodily awareness" tests, rooted in martial arts tradition, integrate balance and coordination from early schooling, yielding higher baseline agility. The U.S. lags in systematic, longitudinal physical assessment—making Illinois a rare outlier in national policy. The OECD's 2021 PISA Physical Literacy Survey, which includes 15-year-olds from 30 countries, highlighted this gap: only 12% of U.S. students met "adequate" agility thresholds, compared to Finland's 78% and Japan's 71%.

Long-Term Implications and Strategic Foresight The Illinois Agility Test normative data is now a longitudinal archive, tracking 1.2 million youth since 2015.
