Moreover, Congress must evolve its approach to crisis governance. The frequency of overlapping emergencies—pandemics, climate disasters, economic shocks—demands agile yet inclusive decision-making. Voting mechanisms must balance speed with scrutiny, ensuring that urgent action does not come at the cost of democratic legitimacy. The future of voting in Congress hinges on a fundamental question: will it remain a space for contested deliberation, or devolve into a procedural arena for partisan dominance? The answer will shape not only American governance but the broader global experiment in democratic self-rule.
