Yet sustainability requires balancing military necessity with local consent. Proposals for greater transparency, environmental remediation, and community co-benefits—such as joint disaster response initiatives—may help bridge divides. Technological transformation will further redefine Atsugi. The integration of artificial intelligence in command systems, hypersonic threat tracking, and unmanned systems will demand new protocols and infrastructure.
