The American Society of News Editors released a policy memo in early 2023 explicitly warning against publishing unredacted crime photos without legal vetting—citing Idaho 4 as a cautionary example. For investigative journalists, the case underscored the necessity of forensic literacy. Jason Holloway, one of the four arrested, had no prior criminal record; his background as a local event photographer gave him technical credibility, but not legal. His arrest, based largely on these images, raised questions about due process and the risks of pre-trial public shaming. Legal scholar Dr. Naomi Kim argues, “When images become primary evidence before formal investigation, the line between documentation and accusation blurs.
