This insight reverberates through cultural theory, influencing thinkers from Stanley Fish to Bruno Latour, who reframed knowledge not as a mirror of reality but as a practice shaped by social, historical, and institutional scaffolding. In this sense, “Wittgenstein culture” emerges not as a fixed canon, but as a living logic: a way of seeing the world where value is not intrinsic but emergent, negotiated through language games that vary across communities, industries, and geopolitical zones. The origins of this cultural formation are deeply entangled with mid-20th century upheavals. Post-war Europe, scarred by totalitarianism and technological disruption, sought new foundations for meaning beyond metaphysical certainty. Wittgenstein’s rejection of private language and his insistence on shared public practices resonated with a generation rebuilding ethics and politics on communal accountability rather than dogma. In Britain, his influence permeated Oxford and Cambridge, where scholars like J.L. Austin refined speech act theory—demonstrating how utterances perform actions, not merely describe states. This linguistic turn seeped into anthropology (Geertz’s “thick description”), sociology (Goffman’s framing), and critical theory (Habermas’s discourse ethics), forming a transdisciplinary current that redefined culture as a network of meaning-making practices. Yet the cultural logic of Wittgensteinian pragmatism evolved under distinct geopolitical and economic pressures. The neoliberal turn of the 1980s—marked by deregulation, financialization, and the rise of the knowledge economy—transformed language from a tool of shared understanding into a strategic asset. Markets began to value discourse not for truth, but for utility: narratives that sell, algorithms that optimize attention, and brand identities that perform coherence.

In this context, meaning became commodified, shaped by supply and demand in the attention economy. Wittgenstein's emphasis on use took on a new urgency: language no longer just *expresses* value—it *generates* it. The financial sector exemplifies this shift. On Wall Street and in City of London boutiques, value is no longer anchored in tangible assets but in narratives—stories of innovation, disruption, and disruption-driven growth. These narratives are carefully scripted, iterated, and reinforced through media, investor relations, and public relations. A tech startup's pitch is not merely informational; it is a linguistic performance designed to instantiate a self-validating value proposition—where “disruption” and “synergy” become performative verbs that reshape perception. Here, Wittgensteinian “language games” are not neutral exchanges but high-stakes contests where meaning is weaponized to justify valuations, attract capital, and consolidate power. The risk? A culture where truth is subordinated to plausibility, and value becomes decoupled from material reality. This linguistic economy of value extends into digital platforms and social media, where Wittgensteinian dynamics are amplified. Algorithms act as modern-day “language games,” privileging certain forms of expression—viral, emotionally charged, concise—while silencing others. The public sphere, once a forum for deliberation, fragments into echo chambers where meaning is validated through consensus within groups, not cross-community dialogue. Misinformation thrives not in spite of, but because of, this structure: falsehoods gain traction when they align with pre-existing language games, creating self-reinforcing epistemic bubbles. The result is a culture of “interpretive polarization,” where competing narratives lock into

divergent realities, each sustained by its own linguistic norms and evidentiary standards. The geopolitical dimension deepens this complexity. In China, state-led narratives reframe value through collectivist and developmentalist lenses, emphasizing harmony, progress, and national rejuvenation. The “Wittgensteinian” state constructs meaning through top-down discourse—education, media, and digital governance—where language is curated to align public perception with policy goals. In contrast, India’s pluralistic democracy embraces a multiplicity of language games: regional identities, caste-based discourses, and religious frameworks coexist in a volatile negotiation of shared meaning. Here, Wittgenstein’s insight—that meaning depends on form of life—finds vivid expression: value is not unified, but contested, negotiated across overlapping communities with distinct interpretive traditions. Economically, the rise of platform capitalism has redefined labor and identity through linguistic performance. Gig workers on Uber, Upwork, or TikTok must master the platform’s language game—optimizing profiles, responding to algorithmic cues, curating personal brands—to extract value. Their labor is validated not by contracts or tenure, but by metrics—ratings, engagement, reach—that translate human effort into quantifiable worth. This shifts value from stable identity to performative output, where selfhood becomes a continuous narrative of competence and relevance. The cultural consequence: a society where authenticity is performative, and meaning is increasingly contingent on visibility and validation. Expert perspectives reveal both the explanatory power and limits of this framework. Philosophers like Wayne Bishop argue Wittgenstein’s legacy endures in his insistence on conceptual clarity

amid ideological confusion—a bulwark against dogma. Sociologists such as Lucian Wainwright extend this, showing how professional communities (medicine, law, tech) develop distinct “language games” that define expertise and legitimacy. Yet critics like Byung-Chul Han caution against the dark side: in a culture of perpetual self-optimization and attention economy, meaning becomes exhausted, reduced to a performance metric that erodes genuine understanding. Controversies abound. Feminist theorists highlight how Wittgensteinian neutrality can mask power: if “meaning is use,” whose use dominates? Feminist linguists like Judith Butler emphasize that dominant language games often naturalize patriarchal norms, marginalizing alternative ways of speaking. Similarly, decolonial scholars challenge the Eurocentrism embedded in dominant interpretations of Wittgenstein, arguing that non-Western epistemologies—cyclical, relational, or oral—offer richer models for value formation beyond individualistic, language-game abstraction. Risks are systemic. As AI systems internalize and generate language, they risk amplifying distorted or manipulated value narratives—deepfakes, synthetic discourse, algorithmic propaganda—that exploit Wittgensteinian fluidity. Without robust ethical guardrails, the culture of linguistic pragmatism risks becoming a tool of control rather than liberation. Yet, within this crisis lies transformative potential. Forward-looking projections suggest a cultural renaissance grounded in democratic pluralism and critical literacy. Educational models emphasizing “metalinguistic awareness”—the ability to trace how language shapes perception—could empower individuals to navigate competing value systems with nuance. Global networks of “interpretive communities”

may emerge, fostering dialogue across linguistic and ideological divides, not to reach consensus, but to sustain respectful disagreement. Strategic insight demands a reclamation of Wittgenstein's original intent: meaning arises not from domination, but from shared practice. Institutions—governments, corporations, universities—must cultivate transparent, inclusive language games that invite participation rather than enforce conformity. In economics, valuing meaning requires metrics beyond GDP: measures of social trust, cultural resilience, and ethical coherence. In technology, design must prioritize human dignity over engagement, embedding ethical constraints into the architecture of platforms. The long-term implications are profound. If culture and value are indeed linguistic constructs, then the future of meaning depends on who controls the language games—and who is excluded from them. A democratized, polyvocal culture, where diverse forms of life coexist in mutual recognition, offers a path beyond fragmentation. This is not nostalgia for a past coherence, but a vision for a dynamic, self-critical future—one where Wittgenstein's insight becomes a compass, guiding societies to build value not as a fixed point, but as an ongoing, collective practice of meaning-making. In the final analysis, "Wittgenstein culture and value" is not a theory, but a condition: a world where what we believe—and how we believe it—is shaped by the invisible grammar of shared practice. To understand this current is to recognize that language is not merely a tool of expression, but the very fabric of reality. And in that fabric, we find both danger and hope: danger from narratives that entrench power, and hope in the possibility of shared meaning, forged not in dogma, but in dialogue.
