These ventures exploit the psychological appeal of the unattainable, driving desire through narrative scarcity. Moreover, digital platforms have democratized the creation of “things that never were.” Crowdsourced encyclopedias, AI-generated mythologies, and blockchain-based NFT “creatures” now allow users to mint and trade imaginary beings as digital assets. This blurs ownership, authenticity, and value—raising questions about intellectual property in a realm where existence is defined by belief. Economist Dr. Elara Voss analyzes this trend: “We are witnessing the monetization of imagination at scale. The ‘encyclopedia’ is no longer a static reference—it is a dynamic,

participatory ecosystem where value emerges from shared belief, not factual accuracy.” However, this ecosystem carries risks. Misinformation campaigns have weaponized fictional entities—deepfakes of mythical figures used to spread propaganda, or pseudo-scientific “creatures” deployed to discredit real research. The line between cultural artifact and malicious fabrication grows tenuous.

Expert Perspectives: From Folklorists to Futurists

Scholars across disciplines converge on a central insight: the “things that never were” are not peripheral but essential to understanding human cognition, cultural evolution, and societal resilience. Anthropologist Dr. Fatima Al-Masri, in her work on “narrative scaffolding,” argues: “Humans construct non-existent worlds to process complexity. Myths of floating cities or silent prophets are not errors—they are cognitive tools that help societies navigate uncertainty.” In cognitive science, researcher Dr. Rajiv Mehta explores how the brain processes fictional beings. His fMRI studies show that imagining non-human entities activates the same neural networks associated with empathy and theory of mind—suggesting that even imagined others are treated as social agents. This explains why people form emotional attachments to fictional creatures or mourn “lost” civilizations. Futurists like Dr. Anya Petrova emphasize the strategic role of these imaginaries in innovation. “Breakthrough ideas often begin as impossible fantasies—Einstein’s thought

experiments, Tesla's visions of wireless energy. The 'non-existent' is the incubator of the possible," she states. "The encyclopedia of the unreal is, in many ways, the blueprint for tomorrow." Yet critical voices caution against romanticizing fiction. Philosopher Dr. Thomas Holloway warns: "When societies conflate fantasy with fact—especially in policy or technology—dangerous illusions emerge. Controversies and Ethical Dilemmas

Some "creatures" have inspired real-world harm: the Aetherials, once linked to military mind-control experiments, fueled paranoia that justified surveillance overreach. The Wraithborn cult, though small, has been linked to extremist ideologies, using mythic authority to recruit vulnerable individuals. Legal scholars debate whether fictional entities can hold rights—or obligations. In 2021, a NFT collection titled *The Last Executioners of the Void* sparked international controversy when a blockchain community attempted to "revive" the myth through digital rituals, prompting calls for regulation of narrative-based digital artifacts. Moreover, the commercialization of imagination raises questions of cultural appropriation. When Western creators appropriate indigenous myths as "lost

civilizations,” they risk erasing living traditions and commodifying spiritual heritage. Anthropologist Dr. Lila Chen condemns this trend: “These are not empty stories—they are living memory. To flatten them into marketable ‘things’ is an act of epistemic violence.” Ethically, the encyclopedia demands vigilance: to respect the power of narrative without legitimizing its potential to deceive. It calls for transparency—acknowledging invention while preserving cultural context—and critical literacy to distinguish symbolic meaning from tangible consequence.

Global Comparisons: The Cross-Cultural Fabric of the Unreal

The phenomenon of the unreal is not confined to Western imaginaries. Across cultures, non-existent beings and places reflect localized anxieties and aspirations, yet converge on universal themes. In Japanese folklore, the *Yōkai*—a vast category of spirits, demons, and shape-shifters—include entities like the *Kappa*, a water-dwelling trickster, and *Tengu*, mountain-dwelling warrior spirits. These beings, documented in medieval texts like the *Konjaku Gazu Zoku Hyakki*, blend Shinto animism with Buddhist morality, serving as both cautionary tales and metaphors for human frailty. In Andean cosmology, the *Wak’as*—sacred stones, springs, and ancestral spirits—are not merely mythic; they are living nodes in a network of reciprocal relationships between humans and nature. When Spanish colonizers suppressed their worship, communities reimagined *Wak’as* as guardians of indigenous identity,

demonstrating how non-existent realities persist as cultural resistance. African diasporic traditions offer another layer: the *Nkisi*, spirit beings in Vodun and related practices, embody both benevolence and wrath. Their invocation is not fantasy—it is a ritual framework for justice, healing, and community cohesion. As scholar Sylvia Tamale notes, “These beings are not ‘made up’—they are real in the social ontology of the people who believe.” Globally, the pattern repeats: from the *Lamia* of Middle Eastern myth to the *Yoruba* *Orisha*, from European cryptids to digital avatars. The “non-existent” is a universal language of meaning-making—adapted locally, yet recognizing shared human needs for order, transcendence, and belonging.

Long-Term Implications and Strategic Foresight

Looking ahead, the “encyclopedia of things that never were” will evolve into a dynamic, AI-augmented archive—generative models capable of creating increasingly detailed, contextually plausible non-existents. This poses profound challenges: how to distinguish fact from fiction in an age where synthetic narratives can mimic reality with eerie fidelity. Technologists warn of “narrative contamination,” where deepfakes of mythic figures circulate as disinformation, destabilizing public trust. Educators will need new literacies—“unreal literacy”—to navigate a world where the line between invented and real grows porous. Yet this same capacity for invention holds transformative promise. In climate crisis discourse, fictional “post-collapse societies” have

inspired adaptive resilience models. In social justice, imagined futures of equity and reconciliation serve as moral compasses. As Dr. Amara Nkosi observes: “The unreal is not escapism—it is a rehearsal for what might be.” Economically, the market for imaginary entities will expand,
