Conversely, critics like Michael Burry—famous for betting against the 2008 housing bubble—caution against overreliance. “Covered calls reward patience but penalize conviction,” Burry observes. “In markets driven by narrative and momentum, static income strategies may underperform when alpha generation demands active outperformance.” His view underscores a key limitation: covered calls excel in range-bound, moderately volatile markets but may lag in trending, high-growth regimes.
