Similarly, in Algeria, women's participation in the war for independence (1954–1962) elevated their social status, but post-colonial regimes often rolled back gains, illustrating how revolutionary momentum frequently falters under state consolidation. South Asia reveals a paradox: India boasts progressive laws (e.g., the 2005 Domestic Violence Act) and vibrant feminist activism, yet deep-rooted patriarchy persists. The 2012 Delhi rape case galvanized nationwide protests but also exposed systemic judicial failure. In Bangladesh, microfinance programs have empowered millions of women economically, yet early marriage and domestic violence remain entrenched. Pakistan's legal framework oscillates between reform and regression—recent anti-rape legislation coexists with conservative interpretations of Sharia law that restrict women's testimony and mobility. Latin America, historically influenced by Catholicism and authoritarianism, has seen explosive feminist mobilization. Argentina's 2020 legalization of abortion up to 14 weeks, followed by similar shifts in Colombia (2022) and Mexico (2021), reflect a wave of radical reform driven by grassroots collectives like *Ni Una Menos*. Yet these gains coexist with high rates of femicide—over 1,000 women killed monthly

in Mexico alone—highlighting the gap between law and safety. Brazil’s Bolsonaro era (2019–2022) witnessed rollbacks on Indigenous and women’s rights, while Lula’s return has signaled renewed commitment to gender equity, though institutional resistance remains. China’s state feminism, once lauded for progress, now faces scrutiny over recent restrictions on civil society and the suppression of feminist discourse, particularly following the 2015 ‘Feminist Five’ case. These regional disparities reflect deeper forces: colonial legacies, economic development trajectories, and the strength of civil society. In post-conflict states, women’s rights often become collateral in peace negotiations, sidelined by power-sharing deals that prioritize stability over justice. Globally, the rise of illiberalism and digital authoritarianism threatens

hard-won gains, as surveillance and algorithmic bias amplify gendered harms. Yet regional variations also reveal resilience: from Senegal’s women-led land rights campaigns to Ukraine’s feminist response to war—where women have become frontline leaders, healers, and resistance figures. The geopolitical map thus reveals no single path to gender equality, but a spectrum of strategies shaped by local agency, historical context, and international solidarity.
