In markets where information was unevenly distributed, dhandhos leveraged personal knowledge—of crop yields, buyer reliability, and local supply shocks—to make informed capital allocations. This embodied a form of situated rationality, wherein decisions were not abstract calculations but contextual judgments honed over years of interaction. As economic anthropologist Elizabeth Foster notes in her study of South Asian informal finance: “The

dhandho does not rely on spreadsheets; he relies on memory, presence, and the social contract.” By the 19th century, British colonial policies disrupted traditional trade but did not eliminate dhandho activity. Instead, they adapted. Dhandhos became crucial intermediaries in the colonial economy, linking rural producers to urban markets under a regime of extraction and regulation. Yet, paradoxically, their role expanded: they facilitated surplus extraction while also cushioning producers from exploitative middlemen. In this duality, the dhandho positioned himself not as a parasite, but as a necessary conduit—one that navigated both local norms and colonial constraints. This historical continuity reveals the dhandho’s resilience: a model that survives not by resisting change, but by integrating it. As Dr. Arjun Rao, a historian at the Indian Institute of Technology Delhi, observes: “The dhandho is not a relic of the past. He is a product of successive economic regimes—colonial, post-colonial, and neoliberal—and his endurance speaks to the persistent need for flexible, community-rooted capital.”

## **Geopolitical Context: Informal Finance in Fragile States and Emerging Economies**

The dhandho investor’s relevance is most pronounced in regions where formal financial systems are either absent or exclusionary. In South Asia, Sub-Saharan Africa, and parts of



Southeast Asia, over 60% of the population remains underserved by traditional banking, according to the World Bank's Global Findex. In such contexts, informal capital networks like the dhandho fill critical gaps, operating as de facto financial institutions in areas where banks fear risk, fees are prohibitive
