This was not merely a recreational diversion. It emerged from a confluence of forces: demographic aging, labor shortages, rising healthcare costs, and a growing public awareness of elder neglect. The scavenger hunt, born in 2021 amid the pandemic’s isolation of facilities, evolved into a multidimensional tool—part therapy, part advocacy, part data collection. By embedding historical inquiry, physical engagement, and intergenerational storytelling into the hunt, St. Clare’s redefined what care environments could become: not just places of residence, but living archives of resilience. Origins: From Pandemic Isolation to Community Reclamation The roots of the scavenger hunt narrative trace back to 2020, when lockdowns severed families from aging loved ones in nursing homes across the United States. Visitation became a luxury, and many residents—particularly those with dementia—experienced acute

psychological deterioration. In response, St. Clare's, under the leadership of Director of Wellness Dr. Eleanor Voss, initiated a pilot program to combat social atrophy through structured, participatory activities. These comparisons reveal a universal truth: elder engagement must be culturally coherent.
