emotional volatility—a metric now traded like credit default swaps. Global comparisons reveal divergent approaches to influence technology. In China, the state operates overt, centralized systems like the Social Credit framework, combining surveillance and behavioral nudging with explicit ideological control. Russia’s approach remains more chaotic, relying on decentralized troll networks and bot farms, but increasingly adopting algorithmic precision modeled on Western tools. Iran and Turkey deploy hybrid models, blending religious discourse with sentiment-driven content. Western democracies, including the U.S., have lagged in institutional capacity, outsourcing much of the innovation to private actors like Holloway—who, despite his intelligence background, became both savior and architect of a new form of soft power. The long-term implications are staggering. The Like Switch marks the transition from information warfare to *perception warfare*—where control of belief, not territory, defines strategic advantage.
