The “body” is then layered: first, coarse outer strata of worn fabric—old agricultural jackets, torn t-shirts, or burlap sacks—providing both texture and durability. the scarecrow becomes a palimpsest of personal and collective memory. Eye placement is deliberate. Glass eyes, salvaged from broken windows or discarded toys, are prized for their lifelike gaze, believed to “see” and deter. In some cultures, painted symbols—crosses, tribal totems, or local motifs—are added to the face or limbs, transforming the figure into a culturally specific guardian. In Mali, **dama** scarecrows wear painted patterns resembling ancestral masks; in northern Mexico, figures are adorned with **farol** lantern motifs, blending protection with communal hope.
