The museum’s curatorial philosophy rejects linear chronology in favor of thematic depth: exhibits explore migration, resistance, cultural synthesis, and memory, weaving together artifacts such as 1860s escape routes’ coded quilts, 20th-century protest posters, and digital reconstructions of submerged African villages lost to coastal erosion.
