Climate change is reshaping agricultural zones, but quail's low water footprint and tolerance to heat make them resilient in warming climates. Vertical farming innovations, already tested in Japan and the Netherlands, promise to decouple production from land scarcity, enabling urban quail farms

that reduce transportation emissions.

Meanwhile, synthetic biology opens new frontiers: gene editing could enhance disease resistance and flavor profiles, though regulatory frameworks lag behind scientific capability.
