Labor conditions in Chinese floral farms, especially during peak seasons, have drawn scrutiny over worker rights, highlighting the human cost behind floral "ease." In contrast, Latin America—particularly Colombia and Ecuador—has carved a niche in the premium floral market. Colombian roses, cultivated in the Andean highlands, combine favorable climate with export infrastructure, supplying 30% of U.S. Valentine's Day roses. These flowers benefit from both natural suitability and strategic trade agreements, positioning them as symbols of both tropical abundance and global connectivity.
