With 70% under 30, the youth are both a risk and a resource—if properly educated, employed, and included, they can drive transformation. If excluded, they become a destabilizing force.’ Similarly, Dr. Funmilayo Olaniyi, political philosopher at the University of Ibadan, contends: ‘The state’s legitimacy depends on delivering tangible benefits—security, jobs, education, health—not just rhetoric.
