By the 1870s, as federal attention waned and Reconstruction faltered, Southern states began formalizing segregation through statute and custom. The term “Jim Crow” itself emerged from this era, popularized by a 1830s minstrel show character—a grotesque caricature of Black life—later weaponized to dehumanize. But the term solidified its meaning in the late 19th century, appearing in speeches, laws, and popular culture as a symbol of racial exclusion. The 1896 Supreme Court decision in *Plessy v. Ferguson* marked a pivotal institutionalization: the doctrine of “separate but equal” was not merely a judicial ruling, but a constitutional endorsement of state-enforced segregation, legitimizing decades of infrastructural, educational, and social apartheid. Yet Jim Crow was never static. Its career unfolded through cycles of resistance and repression, adaptation and innovation.
