The Roman legal tradition refined this further, introducing concepts like **innocent until proven guilty** and the role of advocates, precursors to modern due process. Yet these early systems were deeply stratified: justice was not universal, but contingent on class, citizenship, and power. In medieval Europe, criminal justice became a tool of feudal authority, with local lords administering justice through arbitrary rule, often conflating crime with heresy or dissent. The Inquisition exemplified the fusion of religious dogma and legal process, where confession was extracted under torture, and dissent was criminalized. This era entrenched a justice system where law served power, not impartial truth. The Enlightenment revolutionized this paradigm. Philosophers like Cesare Beccaria, in his 1764 treatise **On Crimes and Punishments**, challenged the legitimacy of torture and capital punishment, arguing for proportionality, rationality,

and the social contract as the basis of law. His ideas seeped into revolutionary movements: the American and French Revolutions embedded due process, habeas corpus, and the presumption of innocence into constitutional frameworks. Yet implementation lagged. The 19th century saw the rise of modern penitentiaries—penal institutions designed not merely to punish but to “reform” through isolation and labor—reflecting a shift toward surveillance and normalization. The industrial age catalyzed a global expansion of criminal justice systems, yet their design was deeply influenced by colonial and imperial logics. In Europe and North America, the expansion of state bureaucracy enabled standardized policing and codified criminal law, often exported through colonial administration. The British model, for instance, institutionalized surveillance, racial categorization, and punitive control—practices later replicated across colonies in Africa, Asia, and the Americas. Criminal justice became a mechanism of social discipline, managing urbanization, labor unrest, and perceived threats to order. In the U.S., the post-Civil War era saw the criminalization of Black communities through Black Codes and later mass incarceration, a trajectory rooted in racial capitalism and systemic disenfranchisement. Economically, criminal justice systems reflect and reinforce structural inequalities. The rise of privatized prisons in the late 20th century—particularly in the United States—transformed punishment into a commodity, incentivizing incarceration over rehabilitation. Private prison corporations, lobbying for harsher sentencing laws and extended detention terms, exemplify how market logic distorts justice. Meanwhile, underfunded public defenders, overburdened courts, and racial disparities in sentencing reveal a system where access to justice is commodified, with profound consequences for marginalized populations. The global trade in surveillance technology—facial recognition, predictive policing algorithms—further entrenches these disparities, often deployed in ways that disproportionately target the poor, ethnic minorities, and political dissidents. From a geopolitical perspective, criminal justice has become a frontier of state sovereignty and transnational governance. The post-9/11 era marked a pivotal shift: counterterrorism reshaped legal norms worldwide, expanding surveillance powers, enabling indefinite detention without trial, and legitimizing extraordinary renditions. International bodies like the United Nations and the International Criminal Court (ICC) emerged to standardize accountability, yet their efficacy is constrained by state sovereignty and power politics.
