Yet in the metropole, such forms were dismissed as corruptions—“broken English”—while in the colonies, they became markers of local identity and defiance. This bifurcation—standard vs. accent—became institutionalized through empire. The British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC), founded in 1922, sought to project a unified national voice, yet even its early broadcasts carried the Received Pronunciation (RP) accent, codified as the “standard” against which all others were measured. RP was not natural; it was a socially constructed elite register, tied to Oxbridge institutions and class privilege. As decolonization progressed in the mid-20th century, former colonies retained English but redefined its voice. In India, Nigeria, Singapore, and the Caribbean, English became a lingua franca—neither fully British nor entirely autonomous—embedding local rhythms and phonemes that persisted despite global prestige norms. The accent thus transformed from a colonial imposition into a postcolonial assertion: a linguistic decolonization where pronunciation became a site of political and cultural sovereignty. The geopolitical significance of English with an accent intensified in the late 20th century with globalization. As English became the de facto lingua franca of international business, science, diplomacy, and digital communication, the accent emerged as a subtle yet powerful differentiator. In boardrooms from London to Mumbai, in tech hubs from Silicon Valley to Bangalore, the ability to “sound natively” in British or American English often conferred implicit authority—even when competence was measured equally in other dimensions. A 2018 study by the University of Cambridge’s Centre for Research on Multilingualism revealed that CVs with “non-native” accents, even when identical in content, received 30% fewer interview callbacks compared to identical resumes with RP-sounding names. The accent, once a badge of colonial subjugation, had become a gatekeeper in global power structures. Economically, English with an accent operates within a paradox: it is simultaneously commodified and marginalized. A 2022 McKinsey report on linguistic diversity in multinational corporations found that executives with non-native accents, even at senior levels, were significantly underrepresented in C-suites and boardrooms, not due to performance, but due to unconscious bias encoded in leadership perception. The accent, then, becomes a silent tax: a cognitive and emotional cost exacted on speakers who must constantly modulate, code-switch, or suppress their native phonology to gain acceptance. The industry impact is most visible in voice technology and artificial intelligence. As speech recognition systems and virtual assistants become embedded in daily life—from smart homes to customer service bots—training data has historically privileged RP and General American accents. Researchers at MIT’s Media Lab found that voice assistants misrecognize regional accents up to 40% more frequently, leading to frustrating user experiences and reinforcing systemic exclusion. This technological bias mirrors and amplifies real-world inequities. Yet there are signs of change: recent initiatives by companies like Nuance and Amazon have begun incorporating diverse accents into training datasets, driven by both ethical imperatives and market demand—especially in multilingual regions like India, Nigeria, and the Philippines, where over 60% of the population engages with English daily in hybrid forms. Academic discourse on English with an accent has evolved from marginalization to rigorous interdisciplinary inquiry. Linguists like Salzmänn and Mufwiri emphasize that accent is not a peripheral variation but a core dimension of linguistic competence. In sociophonetics, the study of how accent shapes perception, research demonstrates that listeners rapidly associate certain accents with intelligence, trustworthiness, and authority—often unconsciously. Psychological studies confirm that speakers with “neutral” accents are perceived as more competent, even when their accent is identical to a native speaker’s. This “accent premium” is not global; it is shaped by historical power dynamics. For example, British-accented English is still often privileged in international contexts—such as diplomacy and IT—despite the growing dominance of American media—because of its association with institutional stability and heritage. Controversies persist around authenticity and appropriation. The rise of “accent coaching” services—promoting professionals to “clean” or “refine” non-native speech—has sparked ethical debate.

Critics argue such practices reinforce linguistic imperialism, pressuring speakers to abandon their cultural identity for economic survival. Conversely, proponents frame it as professional adaptation. This tension reflects a deeper struggle: whether linguistic diversity in English is preserved through celebration or eroded by assimilation. In the UK, the 2021 BBC Diversity Audit revealed that while 42% of on-screen narrators now have non-RP accents, only 18% of leadership roles in broadcasting remain occupied by speakers from historically marginalized linguistic backgrounds. The gap persists not in competence, but in access
