In contexts with weaker democratic institutions—such as Nicaragua under Ortega's regime—curriculum implementation became a vector of state control. Independent educators reported pressure to avoid critical discussions on governance or human rights,

In contrast, in more conservative regions like parts of Guatemala, community pushback delayed implementation, with local authorities citing “cultural incompatibility.” These reactions underscore that pedagogical innovation, even when well-intentioned, must navigate deeply entrenched social norms. Economically, the Plan's impact varies by sector and region. In Chile's tech corridors, where private-public education partnerships thrive, modular curricula enabled rapid upskilling in coding, AI, and data analytics—directly feeding into national export goals. Yet in agrarian zones, where formal employment remains scarce, critics argue the focus on digital fluency overlooks foundational literacy and numeracy gaps. A 2023 OECD review noted that while the Plan improved cross-disciplinary skills, it did not sufficiently address early childhood education, a known bottleneck in long-term learning outcomes.
