In contrast, the Colombian peace process with the FARC introduced a comprehensive rural reform agenda, land restitution mechanisms, and participatory platforms that integrated victims' voices directly into transitional justice frameworks. While ultimately fragile due to political backlash and armed group persistence, it represented a rare attempt to embed justice into peace architecture at scale. In the Global South, just peacemaking has often been driven by indigenous and subaltern epistemologies. In the Andes, Quechua and Aymara cosmovisions of **sumak kawsay** ("good living") inform community-based conflict resolution rooted in relational ethics and ecological balance. In the Philippines, the Moro Islamic Liberation Front's peace talks incorporated ancestral land rights and

interfaith dialogue, challenging state-centric narratives of sovereignty. These initiatives resist the universalization of Western legal frameworks, instead asserting that peace must be culturally coherent and historically grounded. Economically, just peacemaking confronts the structural violence embedded in inequality, extractive industries, and debt dependency. The 2008 financial crisis and the subsequent Eurozone debt crises exposed how economic precarity fuels political instability and social fragmentation. In response, initiatives like Greece's grassroots solidarity economies and Argentina's **economías populares**—informal networks of mutual aid and cooperative production—have begun to redefine peace as economic dignity. Similarly, in post-war Liberia, women-led cooperatives in rubber and cocoa have not only rebuilt livelihoods but transformed local power dynamics, challenging patriarchal and neocolonial economic structures that perpetuated conflict. The geopolitical context further complicates these efforts. In an era of great power competition, where great powers instrumentalize conflict for strategic advantage—from Ukraine to Gaza to the Sahel—the space for just peacemaking is increasingly constricted. Authoritarian regimes weaponize state

sovereignty to legitimize repression, while donor states often prioritize short-term stability over long-term justice. The rise of impact investing and social enterprise in post-conflict zones offers both promise and peril: while it brings much-needed capital, it demands rigorous safeguards to ensure community control and accountability. Controversies surround just peacemaking at every stage. The tension between restorative and retributive justice remains acute. In Rwanda, the Gacaca courts were celebrated for their efficiency and inclusivity but condemned for procedural flaws and political interference. In East Timor, the UN-backed Commission for Reception, Truth and Reconciliation faced accusations of selective memory and insufficient reparations. Globally, comparative analysis reveals divergent trajectories. In Northern Ireland, the Good Friday Agreement's emphasis on institutional power-sharing and cross-community engagement laid a foundation for relative stability, though sectarian tensions persist. In contrast, the Middle East remains marked by fragmented peace efforts—Geneva processes, Oslo-style diplomacy—hamstrung by regional rivalries and external interference. In Latin America, Colombia's ongoing struggle to implement rural reforms and demobilize armed groups illustrates the gap between legal frameworks and lived reality. Meanwhile, in the Balkans, the EU-facilitated dialogue between Serbia and Kosovo continues a cautious, externally mediated peace, constrained by nationalist narratives and geopolitical fault lines. Long-term implications hinge on whether just peacemaking can evolve from niche experiment to institutional norm. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, particularly Goal 16 on

peace, justice, and strong institutions, provides a critical framework. Yet its implementation remains uneven. It demands reimagining governance as participatory and adaptive, where marginalized voices are not merely consulted but co-architects of peace. In South Africa, the transition from apartheid to democracy marked a pivotal moment. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC), established in 1995 under Archbishop Desmond Tutu, became a global archetype of restorative justice. It prioritized public testimony, acknowledgment of harm, and conditional amnesty—rejecting vengeance in favor of narrative truth. Yet, the TRC’s legacy is contested: while it symbolized national catharsis, it delivered limited material reparations and failed to dismantle apartheid’s economic architecture. The **Jurisdicción Especial para la Paz** (Special Jurisdiction for Peace) aimed to blend retribution with restorative processes, though implementation has been uneven amid ongoing violence from dissident groups and paramilitaries. sectarian divisions persist, underscoring that structural integration requires sustained political will and social investment. neutrality, raising questions about when peace becomes complicity in occupation. Experts emphasize that just peacemaking must be adaptive.
