This environment fosters what scholars call “epistemic warfare”—a struggle not over territory, but over the very definition of truth. In Ukraine, for example, Russian disinformation has systematically undermined trust in Ukrainian state institutions, while Western narratives are at times criticized for oversimplification or strategic selective emphasis. The result is that populations in contested regions often oscillate between extreme distrust and uncritical acceptance, depending on which voice aligns with their identity or survival strategy. In emerging democracies—from India to Brazil—“crer ou n’importe quoi” manifests as a survival tactic. In contexts where state corruption is rampant and media censorship is common, citizens develop a pragmatic skepticism, learning to evaluate signals amid chaos.
