Traditional art markets—galleries, auction houses, print licensing—have shrunk as creators monetize directly via Patreon, Etsy, and Instagram. The app's subscription model (a one-time \$9.99 fee with periodic updates) contrasts with legacy software like Adobe Photoshop, which relies on recurring Creative Cloud subscriptions. This model appeals to beginners wary of financial lock-in, but it also shifts revenue from perpetual ownership to ongoing access—a structural change with implications for artists' long-term income stability.

Leading artists and technologists offer divergent views on Procreate's role. David Finch, a digital painter and professor at CalArts, emphasizes that the tool's power lies not in its features, but in how it extends human intention: "Procreate doesn't paint for you—it amplifies your vision. The brush is a finger, not a replacement." This aligns with the philosophy of artists like Loish (Lois van Baarle), whose vibrant, expressive style thrives on Procreate's fluidity, yet resists over-reliance on presets, insisting on handcrafted nuance. Conversely, Dr. Aisha Khan, a media theorist at SOAS, warns of algorithmic determinism: "When a tool like Procreate learns from millions of brush strokes, it subtly shapes what gets painted. You don't just paint with the app—you paint **through** it. And that shaping has political consequences." Khan points to the underrepresentation of non-Western brush textures and stylistic conventions in Procreate's default brushes, urging artists and developers to co-create culturally inclusive libraries. Ethical concerns also arise around data and ownership. Procreate's cloud sync relies on Apple's ecosystem, meaning user files are stored and processed in Apple's servers—raising questions about privacy, especially for politically sensitive artwork. Artists in repressive

regimes have reported account suspensions under ambiguous community guidelines, highlighting the tool’s dual role as creative enabler and potential surveillance vector.

Controversies and Risks: Precarity, Plagiarism, and the Illusion of Autonomy

The beginner-friendly appeal of Procreate masks deeper structural risks. Its subscription model, while accessible upfront, locks artists into continuous payments—an unsustainable burden for those without stable income.
