Reed cites the rise of NFT sheet music platforms post-2020, where digital scores are minted with embedded metadata, but the physical waved window retains emotional primacy because it cannot be replicated, scanned, or algorithmed. Controversies surround the gesture's commercialization. In 2023, a Parisian record store sold limited-edition "waved window" sheets by emerging composers, priced at €500 each. Critics condemned it as exploitation—transforming a subversive act into a luxury commodity. Yet supporters counter that the act, when done

ethically—by artists offering free scores, communities sharing publicly—remains a form of cultural stewardship. In contrast, in Japan’s highly regulated media environment, such acts are rare, constrained by corporate control and social decorum, yet persist in underground **enka** performance circles as coded resistance. Long-term implications hinge on

technology's evolving relationship with physicality. As AI-generated scores flood markets, the waved window may evolve into a performative act of human authorship—verified not by digital signatures alone, but by the visible, unedited trace of a hand. Blockchain-secured annotations, embedded in physical sheets, could authenticate provenance, merging analog ritual with digital trust. This hybrid future offers a path forward: the gesture remains, but its meaning deepens, anchored in both tradition and innovation. Experts project that the waved window will persist as a cultural archetype, not as a relic, but as a dynamic symbol. In an age of deepfakes and synthetic media, its power lies in its irreproducibility—the tremor of a real hand, the fragility of paper, the imperfect light through glass. It speaks to a universal desire: to see, to touch, to know that something was made, shared, and felt—not algorithmically generated, but humanly witnessed. The gesture transcends music. It is a statement about ownership in a world of ownership by proxy. A declaration that art, even in its most fragile form, retains the power to connect, resist, and endure.
