By 1908, when the Belgian state took over, the region had already lost an estimated 30% of its primary forest cover. Decades later, post-independence Congo saw a new phase. The DRC nationalized resources, but effective governance collapsed. Foreign corporations—often with ties to former colonial powers—secured concessions through opaque deals. Logging companies like SICOCO and SOCAPAL operated with minimal oversight, clear-cutting hundreds of thousands of hectares under licenses that prioritized

volume over sustainability. By the 1980s, satellite imagery revealed a patchwork of deforestation scars, yet global demand for timber and minerals continued to rise. The 21st century brought a new layer: the commodity boom. As climate change became a defining crisis, forests were rebranded as ‘carbon sinks’—vital for absorbing CO₂. This recognition, while critical, created a paradox. Conservation became financialized. Economic incentives for deforestation are stark. A 2022 World Bank report estimates that illegal logging generates \$5–10 billion annually in the DRC, undermining state revenues and legal markets. Timber, often laundered through falsified documentation, enters global markets via intermediaries in Luanda, Kinshasa, and Singapore. Similarly, mining concessions—granted to firms like Glencore’s Kasulu Mine—enclose vast tracts where artisanal miners, many coerced, extract minerals under hazardous conditions, with minimal reinvestment in local communities. This economic model pits short-term gain against long-term survival. The forest’s carbon sequestration value—estimated at \$2–3 billion annually—pales beside the immediate profits of logging and mining. Yet emerging financial instruments attempt to bridge this gap. The result is a system where the forest's fate is determined not by ecology, but by capital flows and political bargaining. Indigenous lands, legally recognized in theory, are often excluded from benefit-sharing agreements. As Dr. Chantal Mujawampi, a Congolese environmental lawyer, notes, 'We protect the forest, but the contracts that decide its future are signed far from here—by investors, by governments, by corporations that see trees as liabilities, not life support.' This economic reality underscores a deeper contradiction: the global demand for green technologies—electric vehicles, solar panels, wind turbines—drives extraction in the very ecosystems that sustain planetary stability.
