To counter them, society must reframe critical thinking not as an academic exercise but as a civic duty—one that requires institutional support, educational transformation, and technological responsibility. Looking ahead, the trajectory depends on three forces: education's capacity to instill analytical rigor, regulation's ability to curb manipulative design, and public demand for intellectual honesty. The 21st century may witness a renaissance of reason—or a deeper entrenchment of illusion. The choice lies in how societies confront the invisible architecture of fallacies. This is not a call for cynicism, but for vigilance.
