The plan replaces rigid, one-size-fits-all billing with a modular, tiered system allowing installments, digital wallets, and tiered pricing based on travel frequency and income eligibility.

Technologically, the CAP leverages secure API integrations with financial institutions, enabling direct bank transfers, mobile wallet

payments (Apple Pay, Venmo), and prepaid transit cards—all linked to a centralized account. Machine learning algorithms analyze usage patterns to predict delinquency, triggering personalized outreach: automated SMS reminders, adjusted payment schedules, and even direct intervention from transit advocates for high-risk users. This proactive model reduces collections costs by 41% compared to traditional enforcement, according to a 2023 CTA performance review.

Fiscally, the plan targets \$65 million in annual revenue—enough to fund \$120 million in infrastructure upgrades through 2027. The tiered structure includes a “Basic Plan” with upfront payment and 12-month installments, a “Solidarity Plan” offering 30% interest-free installments for low-income riders, and a “Premium Plan” with dynamic pricing for frequent commuters. Revenue forecasting models now incorporate behavioral data, improving budget accuracy by 22% over previous static models.

Yet the design embeds equity explicitly.
