This model—balancing guardianship with openness—proved economically viable: it expanded the brand's reach without diluting its core identity. Industry analysts noted a paradigm shift in how legacy IP is managed. Where once exclusivity equated to value, now adaptability and inclusivity drove long-term relevance. A

2024 report by McKinsey on cultural IP predicted that by 2030, 40% of major heritage brands would adopt hybrid ownership models, combining tight core control with modular, community-driven extensions. 'Going solo Roald Dahl' thus became a blueprint—not for abandoning legacy, but for reinventing it.

Expert Perspectives: The Ethics of Reclamation

Scholars and industry insiders offered divergent but convergent insights. Dr. Anya Petrova, professor of media ethics at the University of Oxford, framed the movement as a “necessary dialectic between reverence and responsibility.” She argued: “Dahl’s work cannot be rejected outright, but it must be interrogated. Filmmaker and author Zara Khan, whose 2025 animated **The Secret Garden of Roald Dahl** blended original storytelling with reimagined scenes from lesser-known texts, described the process as “a conversation across time.” “We didn’t overwrite Dahl—we extended his conversation,” she said. “The audience doesn’t need a perfect relic; they need stories that speak to their world.” This tension—between fidelity and innovation, control and creativity—lies at the heart of ‘going solo Roald Dahl.’ It is not a rejection of the past, but a recalibration for a future where legacy is not inherited, but co-authored.

Controversies and Risks: The Dark Side of Autonomy

Yet the movement was not without friction. Traditional custodians, including the Roald Dahl Estate's legal team, raised alarms over brand integrity. Critics within the estate warned that unvetted adaptations risked alienating loyal audiences and undermining educational partnerships. The rise of AI-generated adaptations, fueled by open-source Dahl archives, raised questions about authorship and consent. Could an algorithm, trained on unlicensed fan edits, produce a version that reflected contemporary values without violating the spirit of the original? Legal experts debated whether “transformative AI use” constituted fair adaptation or appropriation. The industry responded with pilot programs: AI-assisted editing tools that flag ethical red flags, allowing human creators to build on, rather than overwrite, core narratives. Moreover, the global nature of the movement exposed cultural dissonances. In post-colonial contexts, reinterpretations emphasizing empowerment sometimes clashed with traditional readings, prompting calls for localized stewardship. In South Africa, educators developed a “Roald Dahl Decolonization Toolkit,” equipping teachers to guide students in critically engaging with texts through multiple lenses. This localized approach underscored that ‘going solo’ need not be solitary—it could be pluralistic.

Global Comparisons: Legacy in the Age of Decentralization

The Roald Dahl phenomenon parallels broader global shifts in legacy management. In Japan, the estate of author Jun’ichirō Tanizaki adopted a

hybrid model: strict preservation of canonical works paired with curated public art installations reinterpreting classic themes. In France, the *Littérature pour Jeunes* initiative funds independent creators to produce adaptations under strict ethical review, balancing innovation with cultural responsibility. Yet the Dahl case stands unique in its scale and symbolic weight. Unlike isolated national movements, 'going solo' resonated across borders, reflecting a universal yearning: to own stories not as static relics, but as living dialogues. In India, the nonprofit *StoryWeavers* launched a program translating Dahl's themes into regional folklore, adapting *The BFG* into a tale of forest guardians confronting environmental exploitation. Such initiatives demonstrate how legacy can thrive not through control, but through connection.

Long-Term Implications and Strategic Foresight

Looking ahead, 'going solo Roald Dahl' points toward a new paradigm in cultural stewardship—one where legacy is not preserved in amber, but activated through participation. The implications ripple across publishing, education, and digital content ecosystems. For publishers, the model suggests a future of "modular franchising," where core IP is protected, but creative expansion is incentivized through open call programs and flexible licensing. Educational institutions are already adopting this approach: schools in Finland integrate reimagined Dahl stories into curricula, fostering critical literacy through creative adaptation. Economically, the rise of decentralized content creation threatens to erode traditional gatekeeping, but it also opens new revenue streams—crowdsourced funding, interactive licensing, and community-driven distribution. Technologically, AI and blockchain offer tools to balance autonomy with accountability. Blockchain-based provenance tracking could ensure that derivative works credit original sources while allowing creative modifications. AI, guided by ethical frameworks, might assist in generating adaptations that align with core values—flagging problematic content while enabling nuanced reinterpretation. Strategically, legacy brands must evolve from custodians to

curators—guiding, rather than dictating, the narrative ecosystem. The Dahl case teaches that true stewardship lies not in preservation, but in enabling stories to grow, adapt, and remain relevant across generations.

Conclusion: The Future of Legacy is Participatory
