Beyond Bhutan, the trajectory of spiritual power's commodification is most visible in the ascendance of charismatic global figures whose influence transcends borders. Figures like the Dalai Lama, though revered as a timeless spiritual guide, operate within a complex ecosystem of foundations, media networks, and corporate partnerships. His voice, once rooted in Tibetan exile and Buddhist teachings, now reaches billions through documentaries, podcasts, and social media—each platform amplifying reach but also deepening dependency on digital infrastructure and Western-centric narratives. His spiritual authority, while immense, is sustained by an industry: publishing, speaking tours, merchandise, and digital subscriptions—each layer extracting value from devotion. This transformation is not unique to Buddhism. In Nigeria, the rise of megachurches—led by pastors who amass fortunes through tithes, real estate, and media empires—illustrates a parallel dynamic. Leaders such as Bishop T.B. Joshua or Enoch Adeboye command followings exceeding millions, blending prophecy, healing, and prosperity theology with sophisticated branding. These institutions generate billions annually, yet their economic reach often outpaces accountability. Scandals involving embezzlement, political manipulation, and human rights abuses reveal the dark undercurrents of spiritual capitalism. When spiritual authority becomes wealth, the risk of corruption—of using sacred trust to consolidate power and profit—grows exponentially. The geopolitical dimension of spiritual power's pricing is equally profound. States increasingly recognize that spiritual influence is a form of soft power. While these innovations democratize access to ancient practices, they also repackage spirituality as a productivity tool. The same applies to mindfulness: once a Buddhist contemplative practice, now embedded in corporate wellness programs, school curricula, and even military training.
