In South Korea, where English proficiency is a key determinant of university admission and corporate advancement, Bachman and Palmer’s scales were integrated into the TOEFL and locals’ national exams, altering educational priorities toward communicative competence over grammatical perfection. In Brazil, public universities adopted CEFR-aligned frameworks influenced by their work, reducing linguistic barriers for indigenous and Afro-Brazilian students whose native languages diverged from European standards. of their models was not without friction. In South Africa, for example, the Department of Basic Education is piloting modified CEFR descriptors that recognize code-switching as competence, not deficiency. The risks of over-reliance on language testing are equally salient. In migration contexts, high-stakes exams like the IELTS or TestDaF can become gatekeepers that exclude vulnerable populations—refugees, low-literacy immigrants—even when they possess practical communication skills. In China’s “English Proficiency Evaluation” system, overemphasis on CEFR-aligned scores has led to anxiety-driven pedagogy, where rote memorization overshadows fluency. These outcomes underscore a fundamental tension: while language testing offers

transparency and comparability, it can also narrow the meaning of language itself, reducing it to a quantifiable output rather than a lived practice. Globally, comparisons reveal divergent approaches. The CEFR-EU model, rooted in Bachman and Palmer's work, emphasizes descriptors and mobility. By the early 2000s, language testing had become integral to HR systems, with companies like Pearson and ETS expanding their offerings to serve global talent markets. Migration policy also harnessed the framework. Countries such as Canada, Australia, and Germany integrated language assessments into immigration and citizenship processes, using them to predict integration success. The German TestDaF, for instance, evolved from earlier models influenced by Bachman and Palmer's focus on context-specific competence, ensuring that non-native speakers met job-ready benchmarks. This global diffusion reflected deeper economic trends: the commodification of human capital, the rise of service economies dependent on skilled labor, and the geopolitical necessity of multilingualism in diplomacy and
