— Blood on Sacred Soil

The snows of December 29, 1890, fell gently over the Black Hills, blanketing the Pine Ridge Reservation in white silence. Yet beneath this fragile beauty lay a tinderbox of fear, faith, and fury. The Lakota people, fractured by decades of forced assimilation, land theft, and cultural annihilation, found solace in a new spiritual movement—the Ghost Dance. Originating among the Paiute in the 1870s, the ritual spread rapidly across the Great Plains, offering hope: a return to ancestral ways, the resurrection of the dead, and the expulsion of colonial powers. For many Lakota, it was not mere superstition but a profound act of resistance. As historian David Treuer writes, the Ghost Dance “was a way to reclaim dignity in the face of dehumanization.” U.S. authorities, however, interpreted the movement as a threat. General Nelson A. Miles declared, “The Sioux are on the brink of war,” and troops were dispatched. At Wounded Knee Creek, a small encampment of Miniconjou and Hunkpapa Lakota, including women and children, gathered under the watchful eye of Chief Big White. Among them was Black Elk, a Lakota holy man whose later accounts would provide crucial testimony. The cavalry, under Captain James Forsyth, surrounded the site with four Hotchkiss guns, herding the encamped people into a tight formation—armless, disarmed, and utterly vulnerable. The opening shot, likely fired by a nervous trooper, ignited chaos. Within minutes, gunfire tore through the camp. Women screamed. Children were crushed. The massacre unfolded in horror—eyewitnesses later described limbs floating downhill like autumn leaves. Estimates of Lakota dead range from 150 to over 300, with many more wounded. The U.S. Army’s official report minimized casualties, framing the event as a necessary suppression of rebellion. But the truth, preserved in oral histories and fragmented records, was far darker.

Wounded Knee was not a battle—it was a execution. As scholar Vine Deloria Jr. noted, “The massacre at Wounded Knee was not an accident of history but a deliberate act of state terror.” It marked the end of armed Indigenous resistance on the Plains, but also the beginning of a quieter, more insidious form of domination: confinement, surveillance, and cultural erasure. The land, sacred and central to Lakota identity, remained under military control, its significance suppressed by federal narratives that recast the event as a tragic but necessary chapter in “manifest destiny.” The aftermath was equally telling. Survivors were denied medical care, burial rights, and legal justice. The U.S. government, eager to close the chapter, promoted Wounded Knee as a lesson in obedience rather than a wound. Pine Ridge, once a center of spiritual renewal, became a zone of repression. The massacre was taught in schools not as genocide, but as frontier violence—a framing that persists in some historical discourse today. Yet memory endured. In the decades that followed, Lakota elders passed down stories of Wounded Knee, embedding the site in collective consciousness. The 1973 occupation would later revive this memory, but the 1890 massacre remained the foundational trauma—a scar that shaped generations of resistance. The site itself, remote and weathered, became a silent witness. Monuments were scarce, but the land remembered.

The 1973 Occupation: Reawakening Wounded Knee

By 1973, the American Indian Movement (AIM) had emerged as a radical voice in the struggle for Indigenous rights. Founded in 1968 in Minneapolis, AIM sought to confront police brutality, treaty violations, and systemic racism. But nowhere was its mission more urgent than in the Pine Ridge Reservation—site of Wounded Knee,

where survival was a daily battle. The occupation of Wounded Knee on February 27 was not spontaneous; it was the culmination of years of tension. Federal investigations into corruption, police violence, and the disappearance of AIM activists had fueled anger. When tribal leader Dave Jones and others were denied justice, AIM responded with direct action. The occupation, lasting 71 days, transformed Wounded Knee into a global symbol. Journalists like Peter Matthiessen documented the standoff, capturing the tension between armed activists and federal agents. Armed with shotguns and makeshift barricades, around 200 AIM members and supporters occupied the plateau, demanding a reexamination of treaty rights and an end to corruption within the Oglala Sioux Tribal Council. The U.S. government responded with military force: National Guard troops surrounded the area, cutting off supplies, and deploying armored vehicles and machine guns. Inside the encampment, daily life was grueling. Hunger and cold were constant companions, but so was resolve. Leaders like Dennis Banks and Russell Means articulated a vision of sovereignty, grounding the struggle in historical memory. As historian Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz observes, the occupation “was not just about
