Missionary records from the early 20th century note how Urhobo converts often equated *Egbe* with “God,” yet retained ritual nuances—chanting *N’Ogbe* in communal ceremonies, preserving ancestral cadences. This syncretism ensured survival, transforming the divine name into a bridge between tradition and transformation. In the post-independence era, the names gained renewed significance amid Nigeria’s struggles for unity and identity. As oil extraction reshaped the Delta’s economy and environment, *Egbe* became a symbol of resilience—its invocation a reminder of spiritual continuity amid material upheaval. Used in high ceremonies, it affirms divine authority over life and death, order and chaos. Its repetition dissolves boundaries between speaker and sacred, demanding reverence not through dogma but embodied recognition. These practices generate social capital, supporting informal governance structures in areas where state presence is weak. As economist Dr. Chidi Nwosu observes: “The divine names are not relics—they are institutions that regulate conflict, enforce norms, and legitimize leadership through spiritual authority.” The global energy market amplifies these tensions. Oil interests often co-opt cultural symbols, reducing *Egbe* to a brand or slogan. Yet grassroots movements reclaim these names as
